BABY BOOMERS vs GEN X

Magazine has designated the 290th Fastest Growing Company in America. When not recruiting IS auditors, Richard runs a circus.

This month I am speaking at INC. Magazine's prestigious annual conference for CEOs of America's 500 fastest growing privately-held companies. The list of attendees reads like a Who's Who of Business. They have allowed me total freedom to choose any topic I feel will most benefit the audience in running their organizations more effectively. I would now like to share my message to them with the members of the San Francisco Chapter of ISACA.

As we approach the new Millennium, it is time to rethink many of the attitudes and philosophical approaches that have made American business successful in this past century. Nowhere is a change more overdue than in the way we hire and retain our key people. According to a report recently issued by Ernst & Young, institutional investors are suggesting that the most successful companies in which to invest are those which are able to attract the younger generation of workers – the Gen Xers.

Some authorities are suggesting that as many as 350,000 Baby Boomers are retiring from the work force every week. New jobs are also being developed at a breakneck pace. The new generation of workers is much smaller in number, and hundreds of thousands of positions are going unfilled every week. Analysts are saying that Gen Xers are rejecting the positions left open by Baby Boomers in record numbers. I think this is a serious problem and one that we need to examine more closely.

Sociologists who have studied the different generations say that the new workers entering the employment scene have radically different attitudes and value systems from their predecessors. Baby Boomers were fairly traditional in their values: they believed that one has to pay one's dues and work longer hours to get higher pay. After one has developed credibility with an organization, management will start to pay attention to one's opinions.

And professional people who expect career advancement work overtime.

The Gen X crowd, on the other hand, are the latchkey kids who raised themselves while both parents worked to afford a large house, a nice car and expensive vacations. Many members of this generation feel their parents sold their souls to big business and are very unhappy about it. When the layoffs and mergers of the early 1990s hit, it just confirmed for the Gen Xers their worst suspicions – it doesn't pay to be loyal to one company because the company will not repay that loyalty. The younger generation is more cynical than their parents, and, as a result, more demanding. Many Gen Xers reject the notion of working for any big company that requires working overtime and bowing to the demands of management without listening to workers' ideas.

In many ways the newer workers, I think, have the right idea. They look for work that is meaningful, where they can make an impact. They seek employers where their ideas will be considered now – not after paying their dues for two years. They want to work in environments that are creative, energizing and, most of all, flexible to accommodate individual's needs.

Fast growing smaller companies are responding to Gen Xers' demands and hiring them in record numbers. At the time of hire, offers of employment often include flex time, the offer of sabbaticals, the possibility of telecommuting, and being part of a team with specific goals. Such offers approach the goals of the new generation much more successfully than the standard offers from the Fortune 500 with their strict rules and regulations. The new generation values life and time more than money or work-related status. Employers are learning that to retain a Baby Boomer, just offer more money. But to attract and hold onto a Gen Xer, offer them more time to enjoy life.

Many Baby Boomers, especially in the decade of the 1960's, talked about aspiring to such goals, but there were too many other job seekers eager to capitulate to employers' demands to force the issue and put enough pressure on businesses to change. In the new supply-and-demand economics of the late 1990's, there now may be enough pressure on big business to force the creation of a more flexible, more accommodating workplace. Whereas in the past one out of every

four new MBAs chose consulting firms as their employers, now the ratio is only one out of eleven. The majority of the new MBAs are seeking out smaller companies where they can make changes and see their impact quickly.

The irony to the changes afoot and to big business' resistance to the whole situation is that it has been proven by smaller organizations that staff members who are given more flexibility produce much

greater results than people held to strict rules. Most people recognize that they work hardest to accomplish deadlines just before leaving for vacation. They want to get all the loose ends tidied up. Imagine if every weekend was four days long. Then people would work smarter and harder to accomplish the needed results in their new three day work weeks. Sound impossible or implausible? The new generation may just be able to accomplish every worker's dream come true.

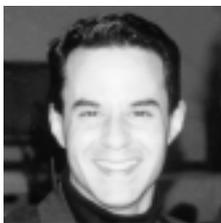
It is hard to imagine that it is already July – only 5 months remaining in this millennium. The Academic Relations Committee has been very busy over the past quarter.

- The Committee spent a lot of time supporting San Francisco State University (SFSU) in the establishment of an IT Audit Curriculum.

Coordination Chair

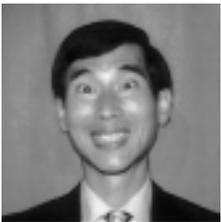

IS AUDIT JOB MARKET

Sandy Geffner is a former IS Audit Director and Manager who is currently President of Valacon, Inc., a professional search firm specializing in IS Audit. He has passed the CISA and CPA examinations, and his article, "Introduction to Auditing Microcomputers", was published by Auerbach. Sandy is very active in ISACA, serving on the Board of the Los Angeles Chapter and Co-Chair of the 1995 International Conference.

The current job market for IS Auditors can be described in three words – HOT! HOT! HOT! This is especially true at the senior and experienced staff levels. Although management positions are still less frequent, that market has shown marked improvement as well. The need for IS Auditors has been impacted by three elements:

- 1 More and more companies are raiding IS Audit departments to fill other positions within the company;
- 2 Big5 has added an incredible number of IS Auditors; and
- 3 Companies have not only unfrozen IS Audit positions, they also have added a large number of new ones. As can be expected with such high demand and limited supply, salaries have been noticeably increasing.

Many IS Auditors are receiving calls from recruiters (both from search firms and from Human Resource personnel at individual companies). Although it is flattering to receive calls talking about how much more money you could be making, keep in mind that money itself does not make for a good career opportunity. If you are challenged, learning additional skills, and making good career progress in your current position, money is not everything. After the initial excitement of having more, money will not overcome your unhappiness with a less desirable position.

If you are happy with your position, but your current salary is well below market, schedule a meeting with your supervisors to see if an adjustment is possible. Prepare for such a meeting by making a list of your recent accomplishments and responsibilities, and have a comparison of your current salary with where others in the field are.

If no salary correction is possible, look at alternative compensations (bonuses, benefits, work hours, vacation days, education reimbursement, CPE support, etc.) and factor them in. If the lack of recognition of your value to your company is still an issue, then it makes sense to assess other opportunities.

In such an active market, multiple offers are increasingly common, and many IS Auditors have the luxury of choosing among several positions. Because of the large variance in salary levels, many companies are offering sign-on bonuses, annual bonuses, and/or stock options if they are limited in what they can offer as a base salary. Even though salary issues may be an initial motivating factor for looking, salary is only one component of the overall package. To enhance your career, maintain your focus on the opportunity as well.
